# January: Cervical Cancer Awareness Month

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), every year, more than 12,000 women develop cervical cancer and more than 4,000 women die from it. Regular screening may detect changes in cervical cells before they become cancer.

Another preventive measure is the HPV vaccines are given in a series of shots. For people ages 15-26, the HPV vaccine is 3 separate shots. The second shot is given 2 months after the first, and the third shot is given 4 months after the second shot. So, in all, it takes about 6 months to get all 3 shots.

For people ages 9-14, you only need to get 2 shots. The second shot is given 6 months after the first shot.

One of the reasons the HPV vaccine is controversial is because it prevents a sexually transmitted infection, which leads some people to believe it's inappropriate for children. But, the thing is, the vaccine works best if you get it long before you have sex.



# February: Heart Disease Month

Heart Disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women in the U.S. Approximately 27 million Americans are living with heart disease and about 600,000 die every year from it.

Heart disease is a group of conditions that affect the heart and has many causes. It includes heart failure, blockages and valve problems.

What is your best defense against heart disease?

Be smoke-free, exercise, control your blood pressure, manage your diabetes, limit alcohol, reduce stress, eat a healthy diet, maintain a healthy weight and visit your doctor.

# March: Colorectal Cancer Month

Colorectal cancer is a cancer that starts in the rectum or colon. The colon is also known as the large intestine and the rectum is at the end of the colon. The American Cancer Society estimates one in 20 people will develop colorectal cancer during their lifetime.

This cancer may not present any symptoms in the early stages but if you experience any of the following see your doctor: constipation, diarrhea, changes in stool color, blood in stool, bleeding from rectum, weakness, excessive gas, fatigue, unintended weight loss, abdominal cramps or pain.

Early diagnosis gives the best chance of curing this cancer.

# Coding Audit

Robertson County received an on-site coding compliance visit in November. Only one area of the audit required a corrective action plan and that was radiology, laboratory and pathology services. Acceptable rate is 8% and we were at 25% (only 4 charts were reviewed). All other areas were at an acceptable rate. Congratulations to Allison Alexander and Lesley Martin.

# FLU Season is here ....(Don't let the flu bug bite you!)

The flu season still has not peaked and it has already been deemed one of the worst flu seasons yet. The flu shot is the best way to teach your own immune system to fight back if exposed to the virus. There has been much discussion about the effectiveness of the flu vaccine but taking the vaccine does give your immune system a boost and if you should get the flu it should be a much lighter case.

The recommendations this year are the same as last year. Every child over 6 months of age should be immunized. When you immunize your kid, you first and foremost protect them, you secondarily protect your family, and third, you protect those kids who can't get the shot, those older people who won't mount a great response to the vaccine and can get really sick when they're exposed, and those babies who are too young to be immunized.

# Immunization Program

We had started in the summer a reminder/recall cards that we send out to our clients to remind them of their upcoming vaccines. The response has been great. We have heard these comments to name a few, "thanks the card was an excellent reminder", "that card made me think to call", and "thanks for your assistance".

There have been several new requirements to the school list of required immunizations, **Hepatitis A** *for all school age children* **and a second dose of Meningococcal Vaccine** *for children age 16.* Our Staff has been very busy fielding calls, answering questions, distributing immunization records and administering the required vaccines. We have been able to add Hepatitis A to our insurance vaxcare hub, in addition to our VFC program; this has been very convenient for the Mason County residents.

We have partnered with the hospital and are now receiving a notification of all babies born and their first Hepatitis B injection. We then send a letter informing the parents that we are available to administer other vaccines. We also can determine WIC eligibility. There has been an overwhelming response to this program. We hope that this will increase our WIC participation and make the Health Department their immunization home.

#### BTDHD Worksite Wellness Program

When I began as a health educator. One of my goals back then was to have an employee wellness program. With the resources we had we made a few attempts at worksite wellness activities. WIC (Women, Infant and Children) Program

We had one of the most successful Farmer's Markets in recent memory. Robertson County achieved 113% redemption rate of their vouchers. Thanks in part to the ingenuity of Lesley Martin, who developed her very own click list. In addition since pumpkins were not available for our clients in Mason County we had to refer our clients to Robertson County. We were able to have the pumpkins delivered to Mason County and our client's children were happy to have their pumpkins for Halloween. Mason County achieved 58%, which is a marked increase from last year. Had we been able to have pumpkins we believe we would met and exceeded our goals. Next year we are planning to surpass our goals for this year. We want to expand the click list idea to Mason County and hopefully gain more enthusiasm with our farmers to participate with our clients more, especially having pumpkins in October.

At the beginning of November we named our three winners of our fall coloring contest. Each winner received a nice prize from the Health Department.

Our WIC programs have been reviewed by the State WIC Program and our reviews have been excellent, validating our commitment to excellence in this program. Our nurses Allison Alexander, Lesley Sweet and Emily Wade as well as our registration staff Tammy Cooper, Lisa David and Lesley Martin strive to meets the need of our participants. They all go above and beyond to service our participants.

Our Breastfeeding Champion Wall has been developed and moms that have exceeded 12 weeks will have their picture added with their permission. Our goal is to promote breastfeeding and encourage all moms to try breastfeeding even if for a short time.

Our Nurses have been working very hard to have a more kid friendly waiting room. Our goal is to address the seasons and holidays. We have had wonderful comments from our clients.
